New Robina Lab

A new lung function laboratory was opened a couple of months back at Robina on the Gold Coast. The lab is running as a sister lab to the Gold Coast Hospital laboratory run by Debbie Zagami (world famous ANZSRS board member!) Below is a summary from the scientist in the lab, Jess Wilson, on the first few weeks of operation:

The Robina laboratory is located within the Clinical Measurements Department, Level 1 at the Robina Hospital. Currently there is only one staff member (myself); however Debbie Zagami from the Gold Coast Hospital is the Director of this Laboratory. Our labs are currently running like sister labs with the number one sister being Robina.

As far as services go, I’m currently only offering basic testing: Spirometry, Bronchodilator Reversibility testing, Lung Volumes (Plethysmography), Carbon monoxide diffusing capacity, Haemoglobin finger prick testing, exhaled CO testing for DLCO adjustment, MIPs and MEPs, Bronchial Provocation using Mannitol.

My equipment was installed on the 19th September, however was not completely functional till the 27th of September. We officially had an open day for staff on the 3rd of October which led to Deb and I being famous and in the local rag (now we have to keep an eye out for the paparazzi on the coast – the simplest tasks like grocery shopping has become difficult)! I’ve had the opportunity to become a master at putting together flat pack furniture, as it was very difficult to find a bookshelf to fit in the room. Business is beginning to take off and Electronic Medical Records is currently bringing the hospital to its knees! I’ve had to fight to put posters on the wall and I am still waiting for a key to my room. I’m lucky I have a dedicated receptionist who lets me in every morning.

Deb and I are currently working towards having the computers networked. It has been a long frustrating process however things are moving forward slowly and business is beginning to boom. Dodging the paparazzi is tiring but it’s all worth while when you get to work at Robina with an awesome boss.
